Dillsburg Emergency Management Association needs to be aware of the special needs of any resident in order to assist during an emergency. If this pertains to you or someone you know, please contact the Borough Staff for a copy of an Emergency Information form.

Dillsburg Borough adopted the International Property Maintenance Code (IPMC) in 2001. Those codes deal with safety and maintenance of <u>all</u> properties in the Borough and will be enforced. If you have any questions about this code, please contact the Borough Office.

You MUST clean up after your dog, whether at the Park or anywhere else in town or you may be fined. Please be a good pet parent; as well as, a good neighbor.

The Borough and local community groups are always looking for volunteers and representatives. Currently the Borough is in need of 2 Logan Park Representatives. The Senior Center could use help with Meals on Wheels and the Library, Dillsburg Emergency Management, Northern Fire & Rescue and New Hope never turn away volunteers. DEMA

The Dillsburg Emergency Management Agency (DEMA) engages in planning for natural and man-made disasters. Our mission is to provide for the protection of persons and property in disasters affecting Dillsburg Borough and the Northern York County community at large.

DEMA is a member of the Northern York County Unified EMA (NEMA).

So many of our disasters are due to Mother Nature delivering "surprises" like tornadoes, hurricanes and floods. The latest surprise is a new bug called the Novel COVID-19 or coronavirus. I wouldn't classify this as a disaster, but it is a public health issue.

The coronavirus along with the common flu virus (which many of us have been vaccinated for) will produce mild upper respiratory symptoms in most people. For those who have existing health issues the coronavirus and the common flu can be deadly.

The flu season should begin winding down as of this writing. But should you feel sick and want to be tested, contact your local Health Care Professional (doctor). You must work through your doctor to be tested which will determine which bug is causing your discomfort. Your doctor is also the person that may recommend additional levels of care for those with existing conditions.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO:

SPRTNG 2020

The coronavirus and the common flu virus (and the common cold virus) are transmissible from one person to another by coughing, sneezing and shaking hands. Viruses can remain infectious for up to several hours on many surfaces. Common sense personal hygiene will minimize the spread of these bugs:

Wash hands often with soap and warm water OR use alcohol-based sanitizers

Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue and dispose of the tissue in the trash

Cough or sneeze into you upper sleeve if you don't have a tissue

Avoid touching your eyes, mouth and nose

Sanitize common surfaces in your home (kitchen and bathroom counter-tops, etc)

Stay informed about how our PA State and Federal agencies are involved in Prevention, Preparedness and Mitigation of coronavirus using www.pema.pa.gov and www.cdc.gov websites.

Above all, preparedness for any situation begins with You. Follow the simple common sense steps listed above including the recommendations found on the websites.

As we move into Spring, follow the local weather reports and pay attention to severe weather warnings. Preparing for Severe Weather means having plans for "sheltering in place" and "evacuating":

To prepare for "sheltering in place" where you live do the following NOW:

- *Communicate with family, friends & neighbors and let them know your plans to shelter-in-place
- *Expand your pantry to include enough food, water, and meds for you and/or your family including pets for at least 3 days or more

To prepare for "evacuating" to a safer place consider doing the following NOW:

- *Plan on where you will go and who you will stay with NOW
- *Communicate your plan to family, friends and neighbors NOW

Street Sweeping

The Borough will be sweeping the streets again this spring. If you have any questions about exact dates when this will be done, contact the Borough Office during normal business hours. Please watch for "No Parking" signs that will be put out when necessary. In order to avoid a fine and having your vehicle towed, please obey the signs.

Weed Spraying

Brian, Public Works Supervisor, has the necessary certification to spray in Right-of-Ways and will be doing so over the next months, as needed. If you have any questions about exact dates when this will be done or type of pesticide

that will be used, contact the Borough Office during normal business hours. Please watch for "No Parking" signs that will be put out when necessary. In order to avoid a fine and having your vehicle towed, please obey the signs.

Recycling Containers

Since our residents are becoming more aware of the benefits of recycling and because it's mandatory in Dillsburg

Borough, larger recycling containers are available. Dillsburg Borough, has larger recycling containers and any resident that would like one should stop by the Borough office during normal office hours. If you currently have a recycling container, that might be damaged and unrengirable, you can



might be damaged and unrepairable, you can bring it to the office and exchange it for a new one.

Trash Pick-up and Recycling

Penn Waste's regularly scheduled trash/recycling pick-up days are Wednesday mornings, with the exceptions of May 27th and September 9th, which will be picked up on Thursday due to the holiday falling on or before the normal pick up day. Dillsburg Residents are reminded it is mandatory to recycle. Here's how you can help:

- 1. Place your recycling bin out for collection on your scheduled pick up day.
- 2. When placing paper products in recycling bin with other recyclables, be sure paper is covered by heavier material so it doesn't blow way!
- 3. Bundle any large loose pieces of cardboard that will not fit in your recycling bin.

Electronic Devices

As of January 24, 2013, Act 108 prohibits residents from placing certain electronic devices at the curb for waste pick-up. Under the Act, your waste hauler will NOT pick up electronic devices. Residents must now manage these covered devices by recycling them. The York County Solid Waste Authority (YCSWA) accepts electronic devices for free at its electronics collection program held Monday-Friday, 8am to 4pm or Saturdays from 8am to noon at 2651 Blackbridge Rd in York. Items may also be taken to Fairview Township, 55 Fairview Rd, New Cumberland, Monday-Friday from 9am to 12pm or the 1st and 3rd Saturday from 9am to 12pm. Examples of accepted items include: answering/fax machines, CD players, electric typewriters, hard drives, laptops, pagers, cell phones, modems, microwaves, personal computers (CPU, monitors, keyboards, mouse, and peripherals), printers, printed circuit boards, radios, remote controls, stereos, tape players, telephones/telephone equipment, TVs, & VCR's

Pool Chemicals

Penn Waste would like to remind residents that pool chemicals should NOT be disposed of in your curbside trash and recycling bins. Pool chemicals are considered hazardous waste and need to be disposed of properly. Pool chemicals are hazardous because when they mix with a small amount of water or are improperly mixed, such as with other chemicals or reactive materials, they can ig-

nite causing fires. They can also cause skin irritation and release toxic vapors. When pool chemicals are disposed of in the trash or recycling, there is a high risk of them reacting because they will come in contact with other liquids in the trucks. Rain, high humidity, and other general liquids



disposed of in your trash and recycling can cause the pool chemicals to react when they are collected by the trucks resulting in a truck fire.

Some Solutions: Do not place pool chemicals in your trash and recycling! Take them to a facility that handles hazardous waste. Check with the pool store you originally bought them from to see if they have a disposal method. Donate them to a community pool or your neighbors who have pools. Shock your pool by dumping the left over pool chemicals in before you close for the season.

What is Stormwater and Why is it Important?



What is Stormwater?

Stormwater is water from rain & melted snow that flows across the ground into the storm sewers & drainage ditches at low points & along the sides of roadways. The

stormwater flows through a system o pipes & roadside ditches that make up the storm sewer systems. The water eventually finds its way to lakes, rivers, streams, wetlands and the ocean.

What is the Problem?

Stormwater becomes a problem when it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants which end up in our receiving waters that we use for drinking and recreation. The volume of stormwater has increased in the area as a result of development with additional impervious surfaces such as paving & roof areas that don't allow water to infiltrate into the ground. Higher flows in stream channels cause the streambanks to erode washing soil downstream & creating steep banks along stream channel.

What can you do to Help?

Some of the ways you can help are as follows:

- •Properly dispose of hazardous substances such as used oil, cleaning supplies and paint.
- •Use pesticide fertilizers, and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess chemicals from flowing into the storm sewers.
- Avoid blowing grass clippings and leaves into the street.
- •Raise your mower height. Raising your mower height to at least 3 inches will allow your yard to absorb more rain water.
- •Help keep storm inlets clear of trash and other debris.
- •Install rain barrels on your downspouts or build a rain garden.
- •Report poorly managed construction sites that could impact stormwater runoff to our community.
- •Pick up after your pets and dispose of their waster properly.
- •Wash your car at a car wash. Chemicals used to wash your car in your driveway can enter the storm drain and enter streams. Car washes filter their water.

GFWC Dillsburg Woman's Club

The Dillsburg Woman's Club was first formed in 1936 by a group of concerned women who wanted to make Dillsburg a place that would encourage families and businesses. Stories say that Saturday nights in Dillsburg were like the old western towns...a little out of control. The following year this club joined a Pennsylvania Federation of Women's Clubs. From there the Woman's Club supported scouting and other community organizations. They were crucial to the beginnings of our Dillsburg Library. Today Woman's Club uses its resources to participate in the two major fund raisers: Pickle Fest and Farmer's Fair. We use our profits from these events to donate back to the community with student scholarships, and donations to other local charities and organizations

A Message from your Tax Collector

Tax Collector, Debbi Beitzel, would like to remind residents that County/Borough Real Estate and Borough Per Capita/Occupation tax bills were mailed out on February 14th and Northern York County School District Per Capita and Real Estate taxes will be mailed in July. It's your responsibility to contact me if you haven't received your taxes and also if your job status has changed!!. Unpaid tax bills will be turned over to the delinquent tax collector or the Tax Claim Office of York County at the end of the year, incurring added cost.

Please be reminded that Per Capita bills are NOT paid by your mortgage companies; forward the real estate bill to your mortgage company if your taxes are paid by escrow. All residents 18 years of age and older, regardless of job status, should be receiving a per capita tax bill. Please notify the tax collector if someone at your residence should be added to the tax rolls.

If you would like a receipt, send a self-addressed stamped envelope and a copy of both parts of the bill, and a receipt will be sent back to you. The State Law states that tax bills be sent to the homeowners, information is sent to the mortgage companies only if they request it.



Permits are required for the following: New dwellings, swimming pools, additions, fences, porches, decks, sheds, garages, window and door replacement, re-shingling roofs, and any structural changes. Failure to obtain a permit will result in a fine!!!!



Please remember that a building permit is needed for all construction, including additions, alterations, renovations and some repairs.

Even Small Projects May Require a Building Permit...

- -Any re-roofing
- -Retaining Walls over 4 ft
- -Finishing or refinishing a basement
- -Pre-built sheds over 400 ft2
- -Any kind of pool (In-ground,
- above-ground or stowable)

What Else Do I Need?

Most building permit applications require a PA-UCC building code review and inspection(s) of construction. These reviews and inspections are completed by Approved Code Services, Inc, and are handled through the Borough office. All building permits must be approved by the borough's Building Code Official, Irv Spoonhour. Costs of building permits may vary. Please contact the Borough office for more info. Depending on the project, you may need a zoning permit. Failure to acquire a permit will result in a fine.

Friendly and Safety reminders

Sump Pump Discharge—While the Borough recognizes the verify, and possibly correct, the problem as their schedneed for sump pump use, property owners should be considerate of their neighbors. A sump pump discharge pipe directed towards adjacent properties can create problems such as unwanted water for your neighbor. When possible owners should discharge the sump pump to a front or rear yard onto an area that can absorb the water and allow infiltration instead of simply directing the water onto an adjacent property. Sump pump discharges directly to the Borough streets should be avoided. Sump pump discharge directly to Borough streets or sidewalks can create nuisance problems such as algae buildup and slick wet spots in the summer months. Constant discharge of water can also reduce the life of the curb and street surface, increasing maintenance costs for the Borough. With proper permitting, sump pumps can be connected directly to the storm sewer system; however it is illegal for a sump pump to discharge to the sanitary sewer system. Property owners should consult the Borough for assistance in determining the proper discharge method for your sump pump.

Streetlights - Please call the Borough Office if you know of a streetlight that is not working properly. You must know the exact location of the light or pole number in question and the nature of the problem. The Borough office staff will then contact Met-Ed. Met-Ed will then add the situation to their work order list and will be out to

Parking Fines - If you receive a parking ticket in the Borough, the fine will be \$25.00. If paid to the Dillsburg Borough within 72 hours the fine is reduced to \$15.00. If not paid within that time frame it will be turned over to the District Justice.

Residents and motorists are reminded to re-new their awareness of children playing and riding bicycles. Please slow down and be extra careful when driving in residential areas by driving defensively and expecting that from behind every parked car a child may appear. Please remember that it is the law -Motorists must yield to pedestrians in crosswalks. Offenders can and will be fined.

Grass? Mow High! Make your lawn easier and cheaper to maintain by mowing high - three inches is the rule! The roots of your lawn grow as deep as the grass grows tall, so taller grass has deeper, healthier roots. Keep your lawn 3" or higher and never cut off more than 1/3 of the blade each time you mow. A healthy lawn tolerates hot, dry weather better - so you won't need to spend your summer watering and fertilizing.

Borough Ordinances

(Listed are a few ordinances that are enforced and residents should be aware of. A complete listing can be found at the Borough office and/or the Dillsburg Borough website.)

Property Nuisances: Dillsburg Borough has both property and zoning ordinances that involve property nuisances. Grass, weeds, trees, bushes and other vegetation should be cut or trimmed to prevent overhanging, unsafe conditions and unsightly and/or obnoxious areas. There should not be an accumulation of trash, rubbish, building materials, junk, etc. on your property that could be considered a fire hazard and/or harborage for snakes, rodents or other vermin. All vehicles, whether on the street or on your property, must be registered, licensed and inspected.

Animals: Ordinance 1988-3 relates to the custody and keeping of animals within the Borough. This Ordinance pertains to the number and type of animals allowed in the Borough, as well as issues dealing with noise, animals running at large and befouling property. An application for a permit is required in order to keep more than 4 dogs & cats, in aggregate number, more than 6 months of age on any premises, regardless of the number of owners. Please be courteous to your neighbors. Take noisy pets indoors. All dogs and cats must be under the control of their owner at all times. All dogs must be licensed yearly. You can get a license at the York County Treasurer's office or online at www.york-county.org/departments/treasurers/dog_licenses.htm. It is unlawful for any person owning or custodian of an animal to permit that animal to defecate upon any public or private property, other than that of the owner or custodian. If an animal does defecate on public or private property, the owner or custodian must dispose of any feces in a nonleaking container for deposit in a trash container.

<u>Curfew</u>: The Borough has a curfew ordinance in effect which regulates the times that young people can lawfully be in or upon the streets of the Borough during evening hours. It is unlawful for any minor under the age of 18 to remain in or upon a public place between 11:00 pm and 6:00 am. There are some exceptions. A copy of the ordinance can be obtained at the Borough office.

Requirements to cut & trim grass/weeds: No owner shall at any time permit grass, weeds or other vegetation to grow on their property to a height in excess of 8 inches, so that the said lot shall conform generally in appearance to surrounding areas. Methods other than cutting or trimming may be utilized so long as there is no interference with or damage to adjoining land. Undeveloped lots greater than one acre in size are excluded from this; a twenty-footwide buffer area must be provided adjacent to all abutting developed properties and public streets and sidewalks within which no weeds or plant growth in excess of 8 inches shall be permitted.

<u>Grass Trimmings:</u> A property owner shall not deposit grass onto a public street or alley, without removing the same by sunset the date of occurrence and returning the street or alley to its original condition.

Requirements to cut & trim trees: A property owner shall be required to cut/trim and keep trimmed all trees, bushes, shrubbery, flowers or other vegetation. A clearance of at least 8 feet above the sidewalk and 14 feet above any street is required.

Dispose of Your Unwanted Medications Properly

Carroll Township Police Department has received a MedReturn box which will be located in the hallway between the Police Department and the Carroll Township side of the building. Please bring all of your old or unused medications to the box so that we may dispose of them for you. These items must be from residential York County sources. This keeps them out of the hands of children and ensures the water supply isn't contaminated if they are flushed down the toilet.

The items that are accepted are: prescriptions, prescription solid or liquid medications, prescription patches, prescription ointments, inhalers, over the counter medication, vitamin samples and medications for your pets. Not accepted items: Thermometers, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, personal care products in the form of non-prescription ointments, liquids or lotions, medications from businesses or clinics, needles (sharp), bloody or infectious waste and hazardous waste. This service will be available during regular business hours at the Carroll Township building, 555 Chestnut Grove Rd, Dillsburg. Call 717-432-4951 with any questions.
